Community Spotlight

Highlights:

There have been numerous recent highlights across the Trust. We have successfully implemented free swimming lessons in collaboration with Aspire, bringing an onsite swimming pool to our schools. Active lifestyles are being promoted through various initiatives, including Women's Boxing Club, Chance 2 Shine - Warwickshire Cricket Foundation, and Gymnastics Positive PE, which have been based at different locations throughout the academic year, offering more sporting opportunities beyond the PE curriculum.

Additionally, we have facilitated more trips funded by external collaborations, allowing children to attend Preston Montford Residential, Wye Valley YHA Residential, INTOFILM Cinema, Slimbridge Day Trip, among others. These trips provide new opportunities and enhance our enrichment offerings.

Parent partnership groups, known as "Friends of...", have been embedded across the Trust to empower stakeholders to actively improve outcomes for the community. We have actively participated in local community conferences focusing on community safety, health inequalities, ward safety meetings, and SEND surveys to gather feedback and promote community consultations regarding co-production.

Our civic duty is reflected in our collaboration with external steering groups to increase community offerings, including partnerships with Hodge Hill, Handsworth, Ladywood, SEND Local Authority, and Perry Barr Family Hubs.

Highfield J & I School have become a referral partner for "The Children's Store House Charity," and Prince Albert Primary is now partnered with the Star Foundation. We have also opened 3 Community Hubs across the Trust for outreach partnership work. Partnerships with faith organizations and local businesses have also begun to develop a deeper sense of community.

This commitment to civic duty is an essential part of our Trust's vision and strategy, ensuring we build a resilient, interconnected community that thrives on shared values and collective strength.

Through school forums, council chambers, and community consultations, they have risen as leaders of today, demonstrating maturity, empathy, and influence well beyond their years.

The project has deepened our commitment to the Civic Duty Framework, empowering young leaders to engage with issues that matter — from youth service funding and accessible sport, to community safety, rubbish reduction, and the broader environmental impact on their neighbourhoods. Y Community Allotments Development

Place Making



The place-making project in collaboration with the Youth Sport Trust has become a deeprooted vehicle for challenging inequalities and reimagining education as a force for civic
transformation. Through this partnership, we have not only created inclusive spaces for
children and young people but also elevated critical conversations around race, representation,
and access. Presenting to the Youth Sport Trust Board meeting and speaking at the annual
Conference on Race Representation in Education provided a platform to amplify lived
experiences and highlight the urgent need for systemic change.

These opportunities demonstrated the power of authentic voice and the importance of centring equity in all we do.

One of the most tangible outcomes has been the opening of our schools for free girls' football sessions, breaking down gender and cultural barriers and redefining what inclusion looks like in practice. These actions are not tokenistic—they are intentional, sustained, and grounded in co-production. We believe that solutions must be designed with communities, not for them. The collaboration with YST has reinforced this ethos, embedding co-production as the heart of our place-making strategy. By listening deeply, creating together, and championing the voices often left unheard, we are not just responding to inequality—we are reshaping the system that sustains it.


